Thoughts from Orwell

In this centennial year of George Orwell's birth, I have been seeing various biographies of that great man and was reminded that I have two volumes of his essays. I pulled one off the shelf and started enjoying his inimitable prose. I came across the following which I believe is worth sharing:

To write or even to speak English is not a science but an art. There are no reliable rules: there is only the general principle that concrete words are better than abstract ones, and that the shortest way of saying anything is always the best. Mere correctness is no guarantee whatever of good writing. A sentence like "an enjoyable time was had by all present" is perfectly correct English, and so is the unintelligible mess of words on an income-tax return. Whoever writes English is involved in a struggle that never lets up even for a sentence. He is struggling against vagueness, against obscurity, against the lure of the decorative adjective, against the encroachment of Latin and Greek, and, above all, against the worn-out phrases and dead metaphors with which the language is cluttered up.

This should be pasted on the wall above everyone's computer.
